Lumber Supply Expected to Increase
According to F. W. Edwards, Secretary of the Ontario Lumber Association, the recently lowered rail rates on lumber have materially aided heavy export. Carle shipping costs, through the reduction in freight charges from \$1.75 per car to \$1.50 per car, are lowered by upwards of \$20.00, which in part is compensating the producer for the extremely difficult economic situation.

Feeding Pigs from Milk and Beans
