"The Ottawa Spotlight"

A WEEKLY REVIEW OF NATIONAL AFFAIRS

Ottawa, January 27.—Whatever illusion the Liberals may have had that their political victory would mean the early arrival of prosperity—such illusions did not exist in the higher echelons of the government. They have been well destroyed by now. It is obviously going to be a long hard pull under any government. There is reason for satisfaction that conditions are not as bad as they were. The direction is right, even if progress is slow. But the three or four super governments are called upon to solve, do not get much farther as time goes on. Unemployment continues to be the chief of the whole affair; any government which can provide a state of affairs in which every one finds employment will go down into history; any government which fails to mend matters will simply go down. The Liberals were careful not to say that their policies would encourage trade and work, and when the day of trial comes, it will be the extent of new government jobs provided employment which will decide their fate.

The Coming Years will get of the next two or three years is one of careful reconstruction, paying off our debts, re-establishing ourselves in world markets, improving our credit, with no extravagant expenditures, no stock of new government jobs, slow and steady improvement in employment and trade. Not spectacular, but realistic. Financial radicals will denounce it vigorously, and call for new way of looking at things. But we must not let ourselves be misled. Other countries are trying to get out of the depression by novel and untried methods. Canada is evidently following British and Australian. The tariff experts at the capital are working overtime. There are applications and inquiries running into thousands to deal with. Some want high tariffs taken off, others want them to stay on. The budget will show to what extent these applications have succeeded.
