#### LOCAL MEMBER SPEAKS IN HOUSE

We notice in Hansard this week that our Federal member, Hughie Clewer, is getting into action. On the 19th of February he addressed the House on the subject of the reduction of the old age pension age limit from seventy years of age to sixty-five years of age. He stated that the Minister of Finance on the grounds of lack of funds in the Dominion Treasury, Mr. Clewer addressed the House in part as follows: "I am in favour of an amendment to the Old Age Pension Act which would reduce the pension age from seventy to sixty-five, not as an unemployment relief measure, but on purely compassionate grounds; to pension men not because they cannot get employment, but because they believe many of our people in Canada today are physically burnt out at sixty-five years of age and so unable to earn a living for themselves and their dependents. I quite agree with the statement of the Minister of Finance (Mr. Dunning) that our people are already 'burnt out' with old age. I suggest in all sincerity that if the members of the House will make a study of the applications to aid their dependents upon the grounds of financial and physical incapacity, they will realize that the pension age should be reduced to sixty-five years. I would recommend that the pension age be reduced to sixty-five years without curtailing the efficiency of the department. The House should have plenty of money to take care of old age pensioners."
