

FARMERS' CO-OPERATIVE BUSINESS IN CANADA

When the Agricultural Economics Branch was established within the Dominion Department of Agriculture in 1923, the object of one of its main works was to study the farmers' co-operative movement. To that end, under joint arrangements with the provincial governments a survey of existing organizations was undertaken in 1923 with the object of determining at intervals of a few years. The information thus obtained forms the basis for a permanent record of co-operative activities, and publications entitled "Farmers' Business Organizations in Canada, 1925," just issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, supplements and brings up to date the information contained in Bulletin 177, previously published. The contents of the latest publication are based on information received from farmers' business organizations in Canada in 1933 and 1934 and comprise the best of information received from the year 1935 and 1936.
