ICE SO THICK FISH SMOOTHER

Believed to be suffering from lack of oxygen as a result of an unusual ice thickness on lower Nipigon river and Pigeon Lake, hundreds of large mackinac bass were reported being found in the open water below the dam in Ontario. Many accidents and sportsmen from all parts of the district were attracted to the dam by the spectacle.

The first appearance of fish was noted in the open water below the dam in the vicinity of Ontario. Hundreds of fish were visible on the ice thrown there in their efforts to get air. Mr. Windsor, fish and game officer, patrolled the spot to put fish back in the water and prevent poaching.

Partners on the lower stretches of Pigeon river, who have dug holes in the ice to obtain water, substantiate the theory that the fish are being suffocated through the lack of oxygen in the water. They said many dead fish have floated to the surface in the water holes. The ice is from two to three feet thick in the river at places being frozen to the bottom.

The 1936 Seed Catalogues

The approach of spring and the arrival of new seed catalogues is a closely associated event. Both are a pleasant anticipation of fullness of plantings for the year. Many of our home gardeners will be embarking with enthusiasm on the new year. Some will be motivated by the aesthetic, others by the utility-value of the plants. A good seed catalogue is a handy reference for the gardener. It is a book that is always looking for something new for their garden, and it is in this connection that the seed catalogues are often employed in featuring specially new varieties. The word 'variety' has a special appeal to persons who derive pleasure from the somewhat gloriously described as 'new and novel'. Because it was often found that the same variety was not always new in all respects, but rather in name only, protective legislation was enacted in 1927. Provisions of this Act make it necessary that new variety names of vegetables and other economic crops be licensed for use, such as 'Heinz' and 'Golden Wonder'. This does not in any way preclude the introduction of a new variety. This does not, however, control the use of spurious names and fraudulent advertising, and descriptions of re-named varieties. This has greatly improved the catalogues and with special reference to 1936 catalogues it is indeed gratifying to note the improvement in connection with descriptions of varieties.

EXTENSIVE SELECTION IN POULTRY FEEDS

Canadian poultrymen have a wide range of commercial mixed feeds from which to select their requirements. Each year sees an increase in the number of brands of these preparations, registered under the Feeding Stuffs Act, the total reaching 250. The range of materials from which they are compounded indicate that the poultry feed industry is reaching a high degree of specialization. Laying machines are most numerous, being produced in large quantities. Other brands for almost every condition of poultry are also available. Under the provisions of the Feeding Stuffs Act, administered by the Department of Agriculture, all chemical feeds are sampled and analysed periodically to check the composition and ingredients, which the manufacturer is required to guarantee and label on feed containers.

Hydro Arrears Must be Paid before April 1st

THE ONTARIO HYDRO ELECTRIC POWER COMMISSION definitely state in clause 49, Standard Interpretation of Rates, that:

"When a consumer is fifteen days in arrears for two months' service, the service shall be discontinued, and service shall not be given again until payment is made in full, including a charge of \$1.00 for the cost of reconnecting. Such discontinuance of service does not relieve the consumer of the liability for arrears or for his service charge or minimum bills for the balance of the term of contract. The Corporation may if deemed advisable make more rigid requirements regarding payment of bills."

THE ONTARIO POWER COMMISSION have instructed us to impartially carry out the above regulations due to the large amount of arrears in Georgetown Hydro Electric System.

ALL ARREARS MUST BE PAID prior to April 1st or service will be discontinued until the arrears are paid in full. This will be strictly carried out as soon as possible after April 1st. No further notice will be given. After April 1st the services in arrears will be disconnected regardless of whether or not the consumer is home when the service man calls.
