The funeral service on Saturday at the home of his son Charles, 104 Mackay Ave., Toronto, was conducted by Rev. Mr. Mustard of St. Clair United, and after service the remains were brought by water for burial in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. The service at the grave was followed by a short service at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Wapshott.
