"The Ottawa Spotlight"

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE DUNNING BUDGET PRESENTED

Ottawa, May 3.—Highlights of the budget presented last Friday by Hon. Charles A. Dunning were as follows: The corporate income tax has increased from 13 1/2 to 15 per cent; where "consolidated returns" are made the increase was from 15 to 17 per cent.

A stimulus to mining development was provided by reducing for the first three years of production the metal mines which come into production before 1940 and 1940 from the corporation income tax.

Reduction in the penalties on late payments of income tax.

The excise tax was increased from six per cent to eight per cent.

The excise tax on automobiles, now five and ten per cent, was reduced and simplified. In future it will be five per cent on all values exceeding \$500. Three and ten cents when imported as equipment on cars can be imported from the manufacturers' company with British content restriction.

The excise tax on cigarettes tubes is reduced from three cents to two cents per hundred.

Charter. Extra Impositions of special interest to farmers, is the effective rate in the duty on grain from 2 1/2 cents per gallon to one cent, and a reduction in the duty on farm implements from 15 to 10 per cent.

Excise duty on Canadian brandy is reduced from \$4 a gallon to \$3 a gallon.

Canadian returning from abroad may now import free of customs duty up to a value of \$100 provided that the goods are not imported. The tourist must have been away at least 48 hours; and the privilege is limited to one every four months.

The reduction in the duties on goods from Britain and other British possessions, and about 35 other countries enjoying "preference" and on the general tariff also are numerous and quite important in their sum effect.

Duties are reduced on 104 items on the tariff schedule, and increased in 12, but the increase are of minor importance, while some of the cuts are quite substantial.

Clothing Costs Relag Cut Textile duties, especially from Britain, but also from the United States, are substantially cut. The specific duties on cotton, silk, rayon, etc. are wholly made of cotton, and are imported from Britain or Empire countries. There are substantial cuts also in cotton cloth, woolen, artificial silk clothing, etc. only from Britain but also from the United States.

Since the duties are heavily on the cheaper line of goods, the benefit of these reductions should be made felt by the consumer in substantial quantities in clothing and other necessities of life.

When the tariff on iron and steel machinery of all iron and steel made in Canada is also included in the reductions from Britain; as is chemical machinery and equipment, the benefits, forgoing for agricultural instruments, powdered milk, etc. waste, and there are British machinery of iron and steel machinery or
