### CIGARETTE SMOKING IS TAKING HOLD IN CHINA

Cigarette smoking has taken rapid hold in China since it was first introduced around 1900. It is estimated that thirty million cigarettes were consumed in 1933. The Chinese people have been known in China for centuries, the tobacco being grown widely throughout the country. Up until 1903 cigarettes were mostly imported, principally from Great Britain and the United States, but in that year a factory was established in China and since then domestic production has grown to such an extent that imports have fallen off from a peak in 1923 to ten billion to 177 million in 1933, according to the statistics of the Ministry of the Industrial Department of the Chinese Government.

British Columbia apples made the largest single contribution (\$8,301,401) to the fruit value of the Canadian 1935 crop.
