SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO
MARCH 31st, 1936

Milton, Ont., April 21st, 1936.

The Board of Directors, Mr. President
and Ladies and Gentlemen,

I never will fail pleasure in sub-
mitting my seventh Annual Report
"becoming your Superintendent,
which might also be considered
the report of the newly organized
Society."

Owing to our year being changed
from December 31st to March 31st
any statistics and figures are
not available covering a period of fifteen
months.

Since our last annual meeting a
number of new cases have been
placed in our administration, making
us now two hundred and two cases
standing being the amalgamation of
the two former Societies, into one.
The Board of Directors has been
met and new regulations laid down
by the Provincial Government
regarding the care and protection of
all Children's Aid cases.

Throughout the Province
possibly, however, these are not new;
it is more a matter of record than
being more strictly applied. Under
the able guidance of Mr. W. E.
Bennett, the Provincial Superintendent,
we are doing our best to make
the work of the Societies
as effective as possible.

It is more difficult to locate
suitable homes for these cases
than others have been given credit
for taking care of.

As a result of this case a number
of new cases have been placed in
the work of the Societies.

In the care of the Society, private
homes are used as far as possible
but we are forced to place some
cases in institutions.

Unfortunately, however,
most of these are not new;

all suitable for legal adoption
are taken up by the two
foster homes available.

Through the assistance of the
Department of Social Welfare
we have been able to locate
a number of cases in
private homes.

It is always a bright
spot in the work of a Children's Aid
Society when a child is permanently
placed in a suitable home.
