"The Ottawa Spotlight"

Ottawa, May 19th—As soon as the budget debate was over, the government proceeded with its address to His Majesty the King asking for an amendment to the British North America Act. The purpose of the amendment, briefly stated, is as follows:

To make it legal for provinces to collect certain types of indirect taxation.

To provide for machinery for a loan council, under which those provinces desiring it may secure a federal guarantee for their loans and refunding loans.

An unsuccessful attempt was made by J. H. Woodsworth, C.E.P. leader, to obtain from the government a statement of its policy in regard to the European situation. That is to say, the minister of the League of Nations, to guarantee, in the European situation, and related matters, the minister took the liberty of that with a situation of full power, the government ought to take a double of the confidence and say what plans are being forward.

While the minister, what the minister of Canada is not to be asked about the continuation of sanctions.

Three Not Right
The effort was successful at the moment because the prime minister said—and in this he was warmly supported by the opposition—that the time was not now opportune, that great caution was required, that no one can ever charge the government in recent weeks had been much more alert to those attacks on our position and to be looked at as than any full-time debate in the Canadian House could have been. No one can ever charge that the minister, when he spoke, had not considered it fairly and adequately in the House of Commons. This will probably be on the minutes of the External Affairs Department. Whether the government's disclosure will come early or late will depend on developments in Europe. No one can ever charge the present ministry with reckless or foolhardy action, and the statement as to our position is not to be looked at as the time is deemed right.

The first comprehensive reply to the Credit Contention, as it came from Liberal ranks during the present session was delivered during the budget debate by J. J. Dochman, publisher and economist, and member for North Huron. There was a speaker on the subject of Credit Contention, and although several Liberals had previously spoken, none of them dealt with the arguments of the new group. Mr. Dochman's disclosure was in earlier debates where the Liberals answered the Social Credit challenge. While no one could say this may have been due to a feeling that it is good tactics to ignore the addresses of one's opponents, I suspect that some of it was due to lack of familiarity with the philosophy preached by Mr. Dochman and his colleagues, and even in some instances to a feeling that it was dangerous to attack such a powerful new movement.

Mr. Dochman's Arguments
However that may be, the Liberal member for North Huron dealt with some of the leading doctrines of the new group. He took Mr. Blackmore to task for asking government help for the sugar beet industry, which, he claimed, meant higher prices for sugar, when one of the points made by the Social Credit leader was that prices should fall as man's inventive genius made cheaper products possible. He assailed the familiar contention that production exceeds consumption, and that a distribute the surplus, but that while in some years, usually prosperous ones, production did exceed consumption, in such years as the last four or five the reverse was true, and consumption exceeded production, surplus was produced to enable it to be bought by consumers.
