"The Ottawa Spotlight"

Ottawa, May 18th.

As soon as the budget debate was over, the government proceeded with its address to the Queen, the King, asking for an amendment to the Naval Needs Amendment Act. The purpose of the amendment, briefly stated, is as follows:

(a) To make it legal for provinces to collect certain types of indirect taxation;

(b) To provide for machinery for a basic credit under which those provinces desiring it may secure a federal guarantee for their loans and refunding issues.

An unsuccessful attempt was made by Mr. Mackenzie King, in his capacity as Minister of Finance, to get the House of Commons to agree to the European situation. That is to say, to give a guarantee to the Canadian government that it would not be compelled to take a stand on the Canadian situation and related matters. What plans are being followed forward? What is the official stand of Canada to go to the League of Nations?

Time Not Right

The effort was unsuccessful at the moment and the bill was withdrawn and supported by Mr. R. H. Deakin, that the time was not ripe, that the situation of the Canadian government in recent weeks had become much more serious to those attending Europe, to keep the world at peace than to go to the League of Nations.

No one can ever charge the Canadian administration with recklessness or foolish action, and the attitude of the Canadian government towards the European situation during the present session was that of a statesman.

However that may be, the Liberal member for North Huron dealt with some of the leading doctrines of Social Credit, particularly the demand for more to tax for asking government help for the sugar beet industry, which he claimed, meant higher taxation, when one of the points made by Mr. Deachman was that prices should fall as man's inventive genius made cheaper production possible. He called the family economists that production exceeds consumption, and that a national dividend should be paid to distribute the surplus. He argued that while excess production was true, nevertheless, production, what was excess consumption. In such years as the last four or five the revenue was true, and consumption exceeded production, reducing surplus stocks. In that event, he claimed, the

national dividend would have to be recovered, and paid by the people to the government.

Mr. Deachman agreed that there was a large extent this was being distributed through the banks and for things. A modern newspaper, a few hundred years ago could not have been bought, he said, for £100,000, but today a man could buy it for two or three cents.
