**SAFETY RULES FOR SWIMMING**

DON'T get into a chop unless you are an experienced swimmer or boatman. Never stand up in canoe, or small boat, nor change seats, nor live about in unnecessary manner. This is the most dangerous thing you can do and more accidents happen through this than from any other cause.

DON'T swim alone. You may become fatigued and there will be no one to come to your assistance.

DON'T swim for at least an hour after a meal. If you are to be swimmers, swim with stomach empty, which, in almost every case, renders the swimmer helpless.

DON'T go on long swims unless accompanied by a boat.

DON'T forget that it takes as much ability to be able to swim in water five feet in depth as it does in much deeper water, and that if you swim in shallow water you can always feel when tired.

DON'T dive into water unless you are sure it is free from obstacles and of sufficient depth for diving.

DON'T use inner tubes to learn to swim or play on. They may slip away and let you sink in deep water.

DON'T try to swim after a ball or anything else being blown out from shore. It can travel faster than you can swim and you may become tired and unable to swim back to shore.

DON'T climb out on rock piers. They are slippery. You may slip and break your neck or seriously injure yourself.

DON'T try to help if it is not required. You may help someone else and then nobody may pay attention to your difficulties.

**DEAD LETTER OFFICE MAKES MONEY**

Canada has thousands of persons who are careless when writing addresses on letters before posting, with the result that the destination of same is the Dead Letter Office and not the party for whom the letters are intended. The Postal officials have done everything possible to eliminate such carelessness but apparently there are many people who refuse to pay heed to such advice. In a recent report of the Post Office Department at Ottawa, it was shown that in the twelve months period ending March 31st, 1935, 36,008 letters were ordinary domestic dead letters. The cheques, money orders, stamps and cash found in these exceeded \$100,000, all on account of improper addresses—careless direction of mail. As a consequence the Government is richer and the public poorer, but is the public wiser? Because of these revelations, will the public become more cautious and protect itself in the future? It is doubtful.

Over a million letters are ordinary dead letters every year, but this is a small world after all, but this revelation does not seem to stir true indignation. The fact that each year a single large city—say Toronto—loses an amount of money in the face of grossly negligent mailing may be a small thing to some, but if you consider that there are 100,000,000 people in the world, and that the average person has 100 letters a year, it is not surprising that there are 10,000,000,000 letters mailed each year. **"Bottoms Up" Cake**

These golden, juicy peaches are here in abundance—so here's the time to add a peach upside down cake to the list of all the upside down cakes you have learned to make. Even after you have said a regretful good-bye to fresh peaches, you can still make use of this recipe for it's just as good with canned peaches.

**Peach Upside Down Cake**

1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour  
1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
1/2 cup sifted peaches (fresh or canned)  
1/2 cup butter, softened  
1/2 cup milk  
1 egg  
1/2 cup raisins, if desired

Preparation: Cream sugar, butter and milk together. Add flour, baking powder and salt. Beat until smooth. Pour into a greased 9-inch pie tin. Add peaches and raisins. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Loosen cake from sides of pan with spatula. Serve upside-down. Garnish with whipped cream, if desired.

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**Migratory Birds Convention Act**

The National Parks Service of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, has just issued the regulations regarding Migratory Birds for the current year. A summary of the regulations as they apply to Ontario follows:

**PROTECTED SPECIES**—Ducks, Geese, other waterfowl, and all birds of prey, including falcons, kestrels, hawks, and owls, and all birds of prey, including falcons, kestrels, hawks, and owls, and all birds of prey, including falcons, kestrels, hawks, and owls.

**PROTECTED PERIOD**—From March 1st to September 1st, and from October 1st to December 31st.
