ANGUS H. DUNCAN
Georgetown lost one of her best citizens when Angus Duncan passed away last Tuesday evening at Guelph General Hospital, following an accident on Monday morning. Duncan was a son of the late James and Mary Duncan and was born in Brantford. He was 47 years of age. In 1912 he was married to Miss Edna Kitchener, also of Brantford. He moved to Georgetown twenty-one years ago and had since been employed as a printer at the Provincial Paper Mills. He is survived by his wife and two sons, Jack of his wife and of Commerce Street, Milton, and Frank of his wife, Mrs. J. J. Kelly, of 141 Lake City, and three daughters, James Patterson, Miss Jessie Duncan, Brantford, and Mrs. Lloyd Frankland of Detroit. Duncan was a member of the Georgetown Fire Brigade and Deputy-Chief for some years. He also served on the Town Council and was chairman of the Public School Board. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and the funeral service on Thursday last was conducted by Rev. D. D. Davidson of Knox Church, Brantford. The pallbearers were W. V. Orant, H. McKelvie, Nelson Thack, and Joseph Hall and Len Marchant. The members of Town Council and the Fire Brigade were former bearers and with the employees of the Provincial Paper Mills marched in a body to Guelph to bury the remains. A large number of an honorable and true citizen and good citizen were laid to rest.
