HOARD THINKS HALTON WILL PAY SCHOOL FEES

"Will Halton pay?" is the question uppermost in the minds of members of the Halton County Board of Education. At last week's meeting it was announced that the account for tuition for pupils in the Halton County Board of Education for the year ending March 31st, 1936, amounted to \$411,147.93. Nine Halton Township High Schools are in attendance at the Board's meeting.

LARGE GAIN IN EMPLOYMENT

Over 28,500 additional workers were employed by Canadian industries during the month of October, according to a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The report shows that 10,020 firms increased their number of employees in October, 1936, over their number in September. The total number of employees in October was 1,015,630, compared with 987,130 in September. The increase in employment was 28,500 workers.

The most outstanding feature of the October 1st, 1936, survey of employment is the unusually pronounced increase in the number of employees in the manufacturing industries, in which the cooperating establishments reported an increase of 15,600 additional workers in October, compared with 12,700 more persons than in September. The expansion in each of these industries was greater than in any other year for which statistics are available. The trade also showed a substantial increase in employment in October, with 1,000 additional workers in the industry.

In services, construction and maintenance the trend was seasonally downward and there were also losses in transportation.

Canada Lags in Fish Consumption

The average consumption of fish in Canada is only about 21 pounds per capita, while in England it is about 43 pounds per capita. Surgery of the Seas

Dr. Adam N. Beattie, surgeon of the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Japan, and his ship's nurse, Miss Margaret Grant Allan, who are shown here, performed two delicate operations during the ship's recent trip to the Far East, via Honolulu, just completed in Vancouver. On the outward trip, between Honolulu and Yokohama, the liner's huge turbines were stilled for nearly an hour while Dr. Beattie removed a rapidly spreading duodenal ulcer from a Chinese passenger. On the homeward trip, between Hong Kong and Shanghai, the liner's doctor's skill was again called into play when a Chinese sailor was struck with a wooden mallet on the forehead. Both patients recovered well, the physician reported. Dr. Beattie, former house physician at Vancouver's St. Paul's hospital, and graduate of University of Western Ontario's medical school at London, Ont., stated that the Japanese's splendidly equipped operating room made the operations little different in practice from any performed in large hospitals. His assistant, Miss Allan, is a graduate of St. Paul's hospital, Vancouver. She has been in the Empress of Japan for the past three and a half years and previously was in the Empress of Russia. Dr. Beattie first went to sea in 1933 aboard the Canadian-Australasian liner "Niagara" out of Vancouver.

Terms of the Loans Simply Explained

HERE IS HOW THE NATION-WIDE HOME REPAIRS SCHEME IS WORKED OUT

Thousands of home-owners, greatly interested in the home improvement plan, are wondering exactly what conditions surround the loan. Let us go about setting one, what it costs and many similar things.

Here, briefly, is an explanation, obtained recently from banking and other sources, of how the home-repair work-out for the average applicant:

Mr. A., after having figured that certain repairs to his home will require approximately \$185 to \$200, applies for a nearby bank for the latter amount for one year. Here's the result:

Loan	\$200.00
Discount	6.50
Receives each	\$193.50

He pays back the latter amount in twelve monthly instalments of \$16.13. Second example: Mr. B. needs nearly \$1,000 to do a bank for this, repayable over a two-year period. Here's the result:

Loan	\$1,000.00
Discount	\$100.00
Receives each	\$900.00
Mr. B. pays back 24 monthly instalments of \$41.67.	

The balance of the information is contained in the following questions and answers:

Question 1—Where do I apply for a loan?
Answer—To any chartered bank.

Question 2—How must the money be used?
Answer—On additions, alterations or repairs to homes already built; but not for building new homes. Improvements include new plumbing, furnace installation, garages, stables, any equipment or fixtures which become an integral part of the building but not for appliances that can be moved. Homes include private dwellings, small apartment houses, farm houses, combination store dwellings.

Question 3—Who is eligible?
Answer—Any man or woman in good credit standing who owns his or her home, whether mortgaged or not.

Question 4—What is meant by "good credit standing"?
Answer—Any person who pays his bills and earns a salary sufficient to enable him to repay the loan over a reasonable period.

Question 5—Are endorses required?
Answer—No.

Question 6—How is the money repaid?
Answer—Usually monthly, but quarterly or other payments suitable to the borrower may be arranged. Loans extend from six months to three years, according to case.

Question 7—Are there any additional charges?
Answer—No.

Question 8—Are forms filled out?
Answer—Yes, the bank supplies forms which require such information as income, obligations, list of assets, location of property, and description of improvements, and similar matters, all of which are treated confidentially.

Question 9—Do the loan conditions apply to farmers?
Answer—Yes.

Question 10—What is the maximum amount?
Answer—\$2,000.

Question 11—If I wear them, others—but don't tell them.
