Seriously Injured When Cars Collided

MR. FREDERICK NATHAN RECOVERING FROM INJURIES IN GUELPH HOSPITAL

A serious auto accident occurred on Saturday evening last on No. 7 highway, just west of Georgetown, when a car driven by William Bonham ran into the rear of one driven by Harry, who had stopped to pick up William Gladwin.

Mr. Bonham, who was in the car with his son, was thrown to the pavement, his head hitting the curb. His son, Fred, was taken to hospital and suffered a head cut and suffered from shock. He was brought to Georgetown where he received treatment and attended by Dr. H. C. McCutcheon's Ambulance.

William Bonham had his lip split open, his eye bruised and suffered a slight concussion, but is now able to be up around the house.

Mr. Eley, who lives on the 8th line above Georgetown, received a scalp above his left ear, and his right ear was badly shaken up. Mr. Eley and other lodgers assisted in making the first aid bandages night in the history of Civic Lodge.

Both cars were badly wrecked and it is unlikely that they will be repaired.

At last reports, Mr. Fred Bonham was in fair condition, and progress toward recovery was being made.
