CORRESPONDENCE

TRESPASSING ON RAILWAY

Georgetown, Ontario, Dec. 21st, 1936.

Dear Mr. Editor:

About two years ago you gave us space in your paper for the purpose of advising the parents of Georgetown of the danger, and penalties connected with trespassing on property of the Canadian National Railways. Our warning at that time served its purpose and except in one or two cases where court action was necessary, the practice stopped. We are again, however, faced with the same problem.

The Canadian National Railways have advised us that some of their trains have had to come to a stop before reaching the station in order to avoid hitting children walking on the tracks. These children paid no attention to the bell and whistle. They apparently did not realize the danger they were in, or else they were deliberately causing inconvenience to the train crew. In either case, a very poor home influence is indicated.

The Canadian National Railways will do all in their power to avoid accidents. We, the School Board, will do all we can through our teaching staff to teach safety to the school children of Georgetown, but we must have the cooperation of the parents in order to obtain any results. We realize that parents cannot follow their children around to keep them out of mischief, but we believe that if the children are properly taught at home, they will be able to avoid the more dangerous practices, even if they do get into a bit of mischief now and then. Walking on railway tracks is very dangerous and will result in the death of some young boy or girl. But there will be no danger of anything like that happening if the children keep off railway property. The parents to help us protect the lives of the children of Georgetown.

We understand that the C.N.R. police are patrolling the railway property in the vicinity of Georgetown with a view to preventing accidents. This will pressure in Police Court the parents of any children found walking on the tracks.
