Benchers on Dec. 34 require: All lawyers to keep strict and proper accounts. Separation of clients' money from lawyers' funds

Retention of all funds to clients in then throw them away on a creay a separate trust account or accounts. hunch h That the books of lawyers be investigated by a chartered accountant "What is the odds on this bere l'icut the instigation of the Law Society! or their Discipline Committee or following a complaint.

That the lawyer whose books are under investigation be obliged to produce to the chartered accountant all such books, records, vouchers and blue to do, documents the accountant may re-

The Benchers are given power to treat any infringement of the rules as professional misconduct as a recult of which the barrister or colicitor gullty of such infringement may be disbarred or suspended. Certain exceptions are made to the rules governing clients' funds. The new rules say in part: "Before instituting an investigation on a complaint made by a third person, the Benchers or Discipline Committee may require prima facie evidence that a ground of complaint exists, and may require the payment by such complainant to the Law Society of a reasonable sum to be fixed by the Bencher, or Ducinline Committee to cover costs of the investigation and the costs of the barrister and solicitor against whom the complaint is


