## SEED OATS

FARMERS BEWARE what seed grain you buy to sow this coming Spring. There is a great deal of grain being offered for sale in Ontario for seed. A grain shortage has resulted in a demand for Western Feed Oats. These oats are being sold for Feed but some farmers may re-clean them and use part of them for seed.

Germination Tests of samples of such oats at home by sowing a number of kernels either between two sheets of dampened blotting paper or in a box of earth. The sample sown must be a fair average of the lot.

The Sowing of Seed may have disastrous results on the crop.

A survey of the grain held in Ontario would indicate there is sufficient good seed to be obtained at home, and all farmers who must purchase seed grain this year should make careful selection upon Germination Tests. A farmer can make a simple and accurate test at home by sowing a number of kernels either between two sheets of dampened blotting paper or in a box of earth. The sample sown must be a fair average of the lot.

## History of Georgetown As Gleaned from Historical Atlas

Centennial Readers will Mark with Interest the Great Advancement made by this Community since 1837.

Each week for the next three or four weeks we will publish the history of Georgetown as taken from the Halton County Historical Atlas dated 1877. It is an incorporated village situated in the north-westerly part of the township of Quanaqua, containing about 1500 inhabitants. It has the reputation of being one of the most enterprising villages of its size in the Province. The River Credit and its branches run through the village and supply power for quite a number of energetic manufacturers. The late Mr. George Kennedy and his family were the first settlers in the place, having come to the place in 1820. In 1827, there were only three families in the settlement, viz. Marquis Goodnow, Sylvester Garrison and Mr. George Kennedy. The next year the Barber Brothers settled in the place and started their woolen mill. The settlement was known as "Hungry Hollow," shortly after it was christened "Georgetown" after its founder, George Kennedy.

The first store opened in the place was owned by Mr. John Sumption, who started business in 1820. The next store was started by Mr. James Young in 1821, who carried on business for a great many years. He is now manager of the Bank of Canada, which was built at the same time by Mr. Litch.

In 1840 the Wesleyan Methodist Church was built, which had regular services in its unit last winter. It was replaced by a handsome brick structure at a cost of about \$5000. The present minister, Rev. Mr. Unsworth, has been preaching in the church for the last 26 years. The building at the present time is a fine one, and is well adapted for the purpose of a church.
