NEW SPEED LIMIT

EFFECTIVE MAY 24

New Regulations Permit 50 M.P.H. on Highways, 30 in Municipalities

Ontario's new motorizing speed limits - fifty miles per hour on the open highway and thirty miles per hour in all incorporated municipalities - "built up areas" - does not come into effect until May 24. Attorney-General Rossback announced over the week end.

The bill was given Royal assent in the Legislature on Thursday, March 25. Ordinarily, it would have been operative forthwith, but under legislation introduced earlier in the session by the Government its operation is indirectly held up for sixty days.

Municipalities will just have to put up with the thirty-mile limit prescribed for them. J. P. Bickell, registrar of motor vehicles, stated Saturday. They have no power themselves, to reduce it, he added.
