EMPIRE TO CELEBRATE CANADA WILL SIGNAL CROWNING OF KING

Radio to carry description of the Empire's greatest pageant to all parts of the world.

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has completed arrangements with the Canadian Government to make available for re-transmission in Canada all programs of importance in connection with the Coronation on May 12th.

This unique feature in connection with the Coronation will be the broadcast of King George VI's address to the Boy Scouts of Canada, according to announcement today by Sir Edward George, K.C., Lt.-Gov. and President of the Canadian Boy Scouts.

Sir Edward will preside at the coronation service in Westminster Abbey.

Every effort is being made for complete coverage of the ceremony.

Immediately after the Coronation, which is to be held at the Palace of Westminster, London, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation will broadcast a special program for the benefit of listeners in this country.

At 12 noon, the Canadian Broadcasters will switch to London for the commencement of the "colorful" and dramatic ceremony, which will be broadcast live from the route of the procession from Buckingham Palace to the Abbey, and then back to the Palace of Westminster.

At 1 p.m. a commentator will describe the departure of the Royal cortège which, as it winds its way along the circuitous route through the heart of London, will keep in touch with other observers at five additional points of vantage.

The actual words of the Coronation, which is expected to last for about two hours, will be carried by radio through microphones placed at various points throughout the Abbey and a description will be given of the Civic Committees, which are to be seen at the time of the coronation.
