
TO CONTINUE ONTARIO COST OF MILK SURVEY The Ontario Curt of Milk Production Project is to be carried on for another year. This decision was

reached in Toronto recently by the Joint Cost Committee composed or representatives of the organized milk producers of Ontario, the Economics Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and the Ontario Agriculture College, Guelph. More than 1600 milk producers are at present registered in the project for the year ending June 30, 1937. These dairymen are keeping a record of their business and at the end of the year the books will be collected in Ottawn for analysis. Complete reports based on the record will then be prepared and mailed to each co-

This study is the largest of to kind ever conducted in Canada and to being carried out so that dairymen may gain a definite idea of the cost of producing milk. The data will uncoubtedly be very helpful to all con-

The accounting year for the 1937-1938 project begins on May 1, 1937. In 1936-37 it began on July 1st. During the ensuing year it is planned to have someone visit each co-operator as was done last for the purpose of offering assistance.

All dairymen in Ontario who care to avail themselves of the service provided in this farm management study are invited to do so. Registration in the 1937-38 program should be made before May 1, 1937 and may be done by writing to the Economics Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

HOME IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Any home that is occupied by more than two people will find plenty of use for an extra living room. Space in attics or basements may often be converted to this use and funds for the necessary work may be obtained from a bank or other authorized lending institution under the terms of the Home Improvement Plan. The loan may be repaid in instalments over a period up to five years if neces-

Occasionally little work is necessary to create an attractive room. In one basement, a brick fireplace was built in, to make the focal point of interest. The walls were painted a soft shade of yellow and the floor a deep shade at brown. Composition board was used to close all the corner of the cellar that was being used for the

The ceiling gave the effect of beams, the floor beams being joined with' false ones to carry out the effect. Curtains were hung at the sides of the small celtar windows, so as not to detract from any light that might enter, and to give the feeling of
