"In memory of John Kennedy, who was born in the State of New Jersey, came to this province June 3th, 1996, with his wife and five children. "Died . April 12th, 1847, aged 85 years, 11 monthe and four days." Among incidents in his younger life, was his presence and assistance in erecting a log jail in Sussex County, N.J., near where he lived. He was twice married and had two large families, to all of whom he gave a good common school education. then settled them on farms of at least two hundred acres. He was particularly anxious for the welfare

of his children and frequently admonished them to aim high in life assuring them that their ancestors were more than well-to-do, gent and respectable people. His sons, John and Charles, were volunteers in the war of 1212, with he United States. Charles took part in the Battle of Beaver's Dam. Another son. Morris, was one of the guards over General Wadsworth and other American prisoners captured at



George, another son by his first marriage, was born on Sept. 16th. 1799, in Middleport, Gainsborough Township c On May 34th, 1821, he married Elizabeth Bedford of same township. He was of an honoursble retiring disposition and ways put virtues before wealth. one fault was possibly having too much faith in his fellowmen. In the year 1823 he and his wife and their two eldest children, settled in the north-easterly portion of the township of Esquesing at the site of the present town of Georgetown. They were the earliest settlers in this part and their task was by no means an casy one as the country was practically virgin forest, with little or no meens of communication with the outside centres. There was also present, at all times, the danger of wild animals, necessitating constant care on the part of Mrs. Kennedy to guard

her children's safety. Amid such surroundings, George Kennedy, built the first dwelling in what was to be known temporarily as "Hungry Hollow," but later, about 1837, was to be named Georgetown in honour of it's founder. This home was a log cabin and was situated on the flats near the present site of the Quelph Street bridge. They chose able particular location, because of its proximity to spring water. first store was opened.
