Oreat care is exercised in picking an umpire. It goes without saying that he must know the game from A to Z. He must have almost perfect sight, and some baseball umpires carry certificates from oculists in order to settle any argument about their vision. Sight is not the only requisite. He must have keen hearing too. In calling decisions at first base, for instance, he is listening for the sound of the ball meeting the baseman's glove, all the time he is watching the flashing legs of the rumner.
