Mackay, formerly pastor of Grace United Church in Brampton. The bride, who wore a travelling suit of imported navy blue woolens, with navy blue and white accessories, was attended by her sister, Miss Phyllis McMeelin, who wore a navy and pink ensemble. The church was filled with guests. The bride and groom were accompanied by their parents and other relatives. The reception was held at the residence of the bride's parents. The wedding was a most successful and happy occasion.

90th Anniversary of the Baptist Church

This is the 90th anniversary of the organization of the Baptist Church in Georgetown. The precise date was October 16th, 1847, when, at the invitation of the first meeting, held in the regular Baptist Church, Kew-Forest. At this meeting Mr. Michael Day-fool was chosen pastor and treasurer, and Mr. J. E. Pithon, church clerk. The first pastor was Rev. John Clark whose pastoral record continued from 1847 to 1855. He is described as a vigorous and eloquent preacher, and of a well-to-do family, seven miles distant, and back or went to Guilford and preach twice on a Sunday. There is an important entry in the first minute book which records a resolution that "We send with a letter of introduction to the meeting to be held in St. George for the purpose of forming a general convention, or union of regular Baptist Churches of Canada." The conditions of the church were: Rev. John Clark, Maria Clark, Dinah Woodcock, Michael Day-fool, Robert Burns, Penelope Burns, Miriam McCreary, William Johnston, John Fitch, Atlas Stewart, C. McCreary, J. Moore, and C. Moore. The next members received were Mr. and Mrs. John D. Denny, on Nov. 25th, 1848. Mr. and Mrs. John Smith Denny joined on January 28th, 1848. An event of outstanding importance in connection with the church was the completion of the present building on the opening services on January 30th, 1870. It was indeed a great occasion. The preachers of the day were Rev. E. Pyrie, Principal of Woodstock College, and Rev. Wm. Woodcock, D.D., of Toronto. There were great crowds at the Sunday services, and the church was full on the evening, was of a kind popular at the time, but since gone, largely out of fashion. There were happy social gatherings—those tea-meetings—a feature of which was the humorous and amusing sermons by ministers from other denominations. The building of the parsonage was completed a few years later and both the church and parsonage were opened free of debt.

HERE'S A SIMPLE SPRAY TO KEEP DOGS AWAY

If flowers and shrubs are sprayed with a dilute nicotine sulphate solution and will avoid them. The spray is harmless and the smell is very offensive to these animals even when applied so thinly that persons are unaware of its presence. Nicotine sulphate may be bought at any seed or drug store and should be used at the rate of one-half teaspoonful to a gallon of water.
