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## CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopals of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches, under date of July 8th, 1937; General—Intense heat has prevailist in the Prairie Provinces during the past week and this, combined with inadequate moisture, has further reduced crop prospects. In Southern. Central and West Central Saskatchewan crops are virtually a total failure, and in most other sections of Saskatchewan as well as in Eastern and Northern Alberta. serious losses have occurred. In Manitoba, on the other hand, crop conditions at present are generally favourable. In Quebec ideal weather conditions have been experienced and all crops are showing rapid growth, with prospects generally promising. In Ontario frequent rains have stimulated the growth of vegetation and crops generally are above the average except in Northern Ontario. ... where the rainfall has been insufficient. In the Maritime Provinces crops continue to be adversely affected by dull and rainy weather, although there has been some improvement in weather conditions. In British Columbia there has been continued warm weather with favourable moisture conditions, and the general outlook is satisfactory for all crops other than cherries and strawberries .

Ontario-Rains have interfered with curing a heavy hay crop and the quality will be affected adversely in some sections. Pall wheat its changing colour and is promising. Spring grains are headed with a good length of atraw. The canning of a satisfactory pea crop has commeced. Resot crops, corn and tomatoer, are progressing favourably and present warm weather is beneficial. Early apples, grapes and practically all varieties of small fruits promise satisfactory yields. Phims. pears, and late varieties of apples will be below average. Pustures are in excellent condition. Due to winter killing, production of ulsike and red clover seed is expected to be below normal.
