Edinburgh, Aug. 11th, 1937. Immediately after organization the Conference resolved itself into sections and sub-sections for private discussions from which the press was excluded, so that from Thursday there has been nothing one could write about. I have just come from a meeting of the Canadian Anglican delegates with the intention of overtaking my letters for to-morrow's

But there are so many distractions in this enchanting city. As I walked along Princess Street, I noted the crowds pouring into the park, and joining them found myself in an amphitheatre of surpassing beauty. In a large bandstand in the centre the Banc of the Scott's Pusilers was giving a concert to which thousands of people were listening. At my right as I took a chair was the park side stanting up to princess St. Be-hind me to the left rose the castle and then further on the fine buildings of the Assembly Hall and new College. And on chairs and on the ground, upon the hfliside were spread out the people of all ranks and again And in the trees and grass such green us we rarely see in Canada, and then when I left I walked through beds of beautiful flowers until I came to the Parish Church where there was care and beauty of a quieter type, the grey stone of the church form-ing, a fine background to the green

At the meeting I referred to above we talked of the apparent indifferonce of the Church in Canada to the Faith and Order movement, and one of the delegates stated that on one occusion when he brought it up in his Synod, not one member of the Synod knew anything about it. I have to admit that I have found difficulty in writing of the Conference because I know that it is not a live subject in Canada. It has always been of interest to me.
