The old game so popular in Georgetown in 1837—Canada's national game—Lacrosse, will be staged in the Park on Saturday afternoon. Many will remember the year the Georgetown Lacrosse Team won the Ontario Championship. Well, most of these players will be found on the sidelines—watching the youth of 1837, who are playing on the field. The members of that team were: Frank Wilson, Robt. Erwin, John C. McKean, Fred Hamilton, J. O'Rourke, H. B. Henderson, Thos. Wheeler, Will Sutton, A. B. Bradley, Tom McKean, Charlie Erwin, J. M. Moore, J. E. Peck, Mrs. Wm. Long, John D. McIlwray, manager. But going back some 50 years ago, we have only the familiar names to remember our Actus Lacrosse Club by. We understand that while this team of many years ago was the champion of the team; they were a strong club and were a credit to the town. This team composed of the following players: P. Appell, W. B. W. Gledhill, J. O'Rourke, J. Heron, E. Gledhill, J. McKean, J. O'Rourke, Fred Hamilton, J. O'Rourke. Sachs, manager; T. Hickey, treasurer; Coleman, goal. Baseball has also been a popular sport, and a game is expected to be played at the park on Saturday.
