### TO THE PEOPLE OF HALTOUN COUNTY

In this letter I wish to state my stand on the question of labour problems.

This question has had a tremendous amount of publicity in the press ever since Mr. Hepburn intervened in the Ontario strike, recruited and drilled at the taxpayers' expense 400 special troops to put down a strike which was not a labour strike, but a strike of the unemployed, and finally was a party to a settlement with the United Automobile Workers of America, which is itself affiliated with the C.I.O., the very organization with which Mr. Hepburn was determined not to negotiate.

It is not the public that is given this question has been caused by those newspapers which have deliberately misstated Mr. Hepburn's stand and have charged him with endorsing the C.I.O., which charge is absolutely false. Mr. Hepburn has never at any time endorsed the C.I.O. or any other organization.

On their pledged word, both leaders of the labour movement, to enter into a certain pact. Neither Mr. Howe nor Mr. Hepburn will permit in the future that the public should be the victim of any kind in connection with labour disputes. But where they differ is as to how to handle the situation.

Mr. HEPBURN SAYS that he (Mr. Hepburn) will decide for the working man what he should do. He also says: "I do not approve of the C.I.O. and I will keep it out of Ontario."

Mr. HOWE trusts the working man and says: "The working man should decide for himself what labour union he wants to join. He should not be harassed unless what they say."

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal Party, and Mr. Hepburn, and his Minister of Labour, Hon. Norman Rogers, are observing a discreet silence on this question. There is no doubt but that they are not approved of Mr. Hepburn's stand. On the other hand, Hon. H. H. Bennett and Hon. Arthur Meighen, former Conservative Prime Ministers, do approve of Mr. Howe's position. Does it seem reasonable that Mr. Howe will carry on—and we hope bring further honors to Halton County.

Just another club in Georgetown, boy interested in the sport activities of his home town and blessing his news through this weekly column. Georgetown had a wide-awake executive last year; perhaps the same managers could be prevailed upon to act this season. Get busy boys, and let's go places this year.
