The construction was preceded by a campaign for business which included votes by various "groups" of sections in the country. A bonus of \$65,000.00 was voted." much to the disapproval of a large number of the retempers. A station was built-on the Moore farm, north of the "white bridge," and then there was the junction station, and an over-head crossing at the Grand Trunk Railway. A hotel was built just opposite the main station, where the building, as a dwelling, still stands. George Gibbs was the proprietor for some years. He was striking in appearance, but not otherwise. He was a very popular and very successful auctioneer; had a real senie of humor and was fluent of speech. The railway did good business independently for some years and then sold out to the Grand Trunk. Some of those who fought the bonus by their speeches and votes remembered that in the argument between the Country and the Board of Directors of the railway there was included a little clause which affirmed that if the railway ever ceased to be an "independent, competing road," the \$65 000.00 bonus was to be returned to the County. The Grand Trunk refused to comply and the case went to the courts. Outstanding lawyers like Christopher Robinson, K.C., and Hon, Edward Blake, argued the case at Osgoode Hall; the county won and the \$65,-000.00 was returned. The money was invested and the interest through the years is being used in the support of the Public Schools of certain sections of the county.
