The following recipes, prepared and icsted by the Pruit Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, may therefore, prove timely and helpful:-

traspoon cloves I teaspoon salt 14 pound sugar 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon I teaspoon ground allspice Wash and stem grapes. Place

4 nounds grapes

h pint cider vinegar

raucepan with vinegar, and cook for 15 minutes; rub through sieve time enough to retain the seeds and skins. Boll pulp until thick, add outer inpredients and boll half an hour longer. Pill into hot sterilized jars or bottles, and seal.

Wath and stem grapes. Separate skins from pulp. Cook akins until tender, press through a sieve. Cook pulp ten minutes, press through a sieve. Combine purees; add one pound of sugar to every quart of puree; boil one-half hour, stirring often. Pour into glasses and cover. Grape Sauce (Por puddings or

Juice. Boil slowly 3 minutes. Strain Cool and seal.
