> Commenting on this case, the Honourable Charles Dunning, Minister of

Finance, said: "These sentences should serve as a warning that the provisions of the Home Improvement Loans Guarantee Act under which home improvement Joans are made, are being strictly enforced. Anyone who makes a statement in an application for a loan which is false in any material respect or who uses the proceeds of a loan otherwise than in payment for repairs, alterations or additions to a rural or urban home is liable to be prosecuted."

It should be noted that Section 10 of the Home Improvement Loans Guarantee Act of 1937 provides that, "Any person making a statement in an application for a home improvement loan which is false in any material respect or who uses the proceeds of a home improvement loan otherwise than in payment for repairs, alterations or additions to the rural or urban home of which he is the owner specified in his application for a home improvement loan shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of not less than twenty-five dollars and of not more

than five hundred dollars." This clause does not prevent the Department of Pinance from taking action under the Criminal Code as was done in the case cited above, should it see fit to do so.


