RECIPES

THE PARTY

Parties are popular on the anniversary of the fall and winter season, the following are suggested by the Milk, Dairy and Cold Storage Commission Department. These may be found in the attractive

Cheese Squares

Cut bread into squares (about 1 1/2 inches) together grated cheddar cheese with sufficient butter to make a soft mixture. Spread the four sides and top of the bread squares with the cheese mixture. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in a hot oven or under broiler until cheese begins to melt. Serve hot.

Cheese Muffins

2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup grated cheese
2 tablespoons butter, melted
1 egg
1 cup milk

Mix and sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add grated cheese. Mix in milk and beaten egg, then add butter. Fill tiny buttered muffin tins about one-third full of batter. On this drop a little marmalade or jelly. Cover with batter, filling tins about two-thirds full. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) about 15 minutes. Serve hot.

Cheese Sandwiches

Cut bread three-quarters inch, thick into small squares or rounds. Butter and pile with cream cheese mixed with salad dressing. Sprinkle with finely chopped nuts, olives, green pepper, pimento or watercress.

Combine one 3-ounce package cream cheese with 2 cups minced ham and 1/4 cup chopped watercress. And salad dressing to moisten. Spread gener-

ously on wheat bread. Cut in fingers.

Cheese Squares

2 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup salt
1 cup butter
1 1/2 cups cheese
1 cup milk
1 egg

Sift flour and salt. Put in butter, soft cheese and work into a dough. Chill. Roll thin with cookie cutter. Bake in a hot oven, 375 degrees F., from 15 to 20 minutes. When serving put with marmalade or red curdy.

PROSECUTION FOR FRAUD IN CONNECTION WITH THE H.I.P.

Recently a charge was laid against a man and a woman for obtaining Home Improvement Plan loans fraudulently in St. Catharines, Ontario.

The accused pleaded guilty to obtaining loans under the Home Improvement Plan, in one case by false pretences and the other by forgery. The woman was sentenced to two years less one day in Mercer Reformatory and the man was sentenced to three years in Kingston Penitentiary.

Commenting on this case, the Honourable Charles Dunning, Minister of Finance, said:

"These sentences should serve as a warning that the provisions of the Home Improvement Loans Guarantee Act under which home improvement loans are made, are being strictly enforced. Anyone who makes a statement in an application for a loan which is false in any material respect or who uses the proceeds of a loan otherwise than in payment for repairs, alterations or additions to a rural or urban home is liable to be prosecuted."

It should be noted that Section 10 of the Home Improvement Loans Guarantee Act of 1937 provides that: "Any person making a statement in an application for a home improvement loan which is false in any material respect or who uses the proceeds of a home improvement loan otherwise than in payment for repairs, alterations or additions to the rural or urban home of which he is the owner specified in his application for a home improvement loan shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of not less than twenty-five dollars and of not more than five hundred dollars."

This clause does not prevent the Department of Finance from taking action under the Criminal Code as was done in the case cited above, should it see fit to do so.
