Hon. P. M. Dewan, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, will officially open the Ontario Provincial Winter Fair at Guelph, L. E. O'Neill, Secretary-Treasurer, announced today. Hon. Mr. Dewan has always taken a keen interest in the Guelph show and will be present Tuesday night, November 30th to officially open the fair at eight o'clock in the Horse Show Arena. The Show continues till December 2nd with an excellent Horse Show each of the three nights.

The number of entries to date give rise to prediction by officials that this year's show will, undoubtedly, be the best in the 55 years of the fair's existence. It is the oldest show of its kind in the province and farmers of the province recognize it as the "daddy of them all."

RAILWAYS TO FACILITATE REMEMBRANCE DAY TRAVEL

Reduced fares on Canadian railways to provide economical travel for the observance of Remembrance Day at important points across Canada, will go into effect from noon Wednesday, November 10, to midnight, Friday, November 12, according to C. F. Richardson, Chairman, Canadian Passenger Association. These fares will consist of single fare and one-quarter for the round trip, good in coaches; or in sleeping cars or parlor cars on payment of regular charge for such accommodation. They will be good going up to 3 p.m. Thursday, November 11th.
