HOSPITAL EXPENSES UP
Advancing prices in food supplies and general commodities caused the cost per patient at Peel Memorial hospital to rise from \$2.35 per day in 1936 to \$2.70 in 1937, was the announcement last week of David Wilson, president of the hospital board. Cost per patient in 1935 was \$2.90, he stated.

In the year ending Sept. 30th, 922 patients were admitted to the hospital, an increase of 29 over the previous year. Voluntary contributions will nearly pay for the second and third floors of the nearly completed annex, he said.
