She is survived by an only son, Ernest, who resides on the farm, and two sisters, Catharine Inglis, Guelph, and Rebecca Lowrey of Rockwood, except for a brief sojourn in Guelph, she lived in Nassagaweya all her life. An ardent worker in the Nassagaweya Presbyterian Church; in the Women's Institute and all community welfare, her place will be difficult to fill.
