### SOFTBALL HONORS GO TO NORVAL

BRAMPTON BEATEN IN TWO STRAIGHT GAMES

The Halton-Peel Softball League which played its games at the Georgetown Arena this fall, wound up the season last Thursday night, when Norval won the championship. Two straight games to their credit, the Brampton team, the runners-up in the league, went down to defeat in the second game of the play-offs, when the Norvalites trounced them 12 to 0.

Norval discouraged Brampton in the first innings when they scored 8 runs, and from then on they wore a path around the bases. They scored 2 runs in the second and third and three in the fifth innings. Brampton tried hard to get on the score sheet, but "Hank" Rankine on the mound for the winners was too good for them. George Little started pitching for the Bramptonians, but lacked his usual style and had to retire and was replaced by Bill Weller. However the game was on ice for Norval by this time, although he pitched well for the balance of the game, it was too late.

And so another softball season is ended. This year, we believe was the best yet. More enthusiasm and that friendly sporting spirit prevailed, together with better games to the credit of all teams. We welcome them back again next year.

Following is a report of the games last week that were crowded out of our last issue:

Last Thursday the Brampton team eliminated the Georgetown Pirates in a game that held the local boys baffled until the 7th innings, when they rallied somewhat, but failed to acquire the necessary number of runs. Brampton scored twice in the first and second innings, and again in the fourth, while the Pirates were blanked until the last innings when they counted two runs to save a kalsomining. Brampton looked the better team on the night's play, but all during the season there was little to choose between them. The score was 5 to 2.

In the second affair, after defaulting on a game for Norval, the much demoralized Glen outfit met defeat to the tune of 17 to 2. While it was not expected that they would take the Norvalites, had they had their regular squad the score might have been different as the Glen team was leading the league. "Hank" Rankine pitched for Norval, and was in his usual good form. Bill Keack was his opponent and had been given the same support, would have given the visitors a tussle.

Monday night saw the opening of the finals between Norval and Brampton, and also saw the downfall of the Dale outfit when Howard Teasdale's boys went to town to score 5 to 1. Norval put the game on ice early in the first frame when they scored four runs and counted again in the third innings. Brampton were blanked until the 6th, when they succeeded in getting enough hits to score a runner, and were left with two men on base. "Hank" Rankine was the winning pitcher, and played almost game with the exception of the sixth innings. George Little, the Brampton hurler, was not in his usual form and Norval touched him for a number of hits.

The championship is awarded on the basis of the number of points, with one point for first and two for second, three for third. McGill's aggregate was 15 points, O.A.C. was second with 31. U. of T. third with 41, and R.M.C. fourth with 57.
