CHRISTIAN WORKERS

Dispositional, Uniform Sunday School Lesson, November 21, 1937

GOLDEN TEXT: "Let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." Galatians 6: 9.

LESSON PASSAGE: 1 Corinthians 3: 10-15; Galatians 6: 6-10.

A Master Builder, 18, 11

Paul built for the future and his work has endured. The sole foundation for his faith and action was Christ. He said, "For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ."

Paul might have been a specialist in history, economics, ritual or politics, but he said he would do one thing and one only—he would preach Christ and him crucified. Paul knew that he would be replaced by others who would carry on the work, but he was not thinking of self. As long as Christians continued to base their teaching and practice upon Christ they would go forward from victory to victory. In recent years the church has tried many experiments in the way of social service and entertainment. The church has been advised to control athletics and go into the motion picture business and many other by-paths, but the only sure foundation for an enduring and conquering church is the grace of God in Christ.

The Tests of Life, 12, 13

Whether we like it or not our work is submitted to tests. A new chimney may be tested by the first rain-storm and prove wanting, and the failure goes right back to the builder. A jerry-built apartment house crumbles in an earthquake indicating that the builder had used materials unequal to the strain. We too are tested day by day. Can our dispositions withstand the peevishness of some near relative? Can our honesty stand up amidst the temptations of a depression? Do our peace principles fade away when the war makers have persuaded the nations to spend fifteen billion dollars a year upon armaments? It is a great joy to any man or woman near the close of life to look back and find satisfaction in their accomplishments—the way in which a farm has been worked, a house has been kept, a business has been conducted, a church has been led. In a sense every day is a judgment day, yet we should not be unmindful of the final summing up of our life's service. If we are building upon the sure foundations, our achievements will stand the tests of time.

Life's Rewards, 14, 15

How are we paid? There are some material rewards—wages, salaries, profits—according to the kind of work we are in. There are also rewards in culture, the artist becoming greater than his picture, the musician doing far beyond his music. The deepest satisfaction, however, comes from a sense of the favor of God. If we are only trying to please ourselves or to please others, our life will be somewhat superficial, but if we are really trying to serve Christ and be worthy to receive his commendation, there is a constant incentive to self-discipline and self-improvement. Many people who are rewarded lavishly in this world's goods are not satisfied in their inner lives. Some whose names have been known in a world-wide way have found publicity and popularity dust and ashes in the end. It is the conviction that God has a plan for one's life and that one is following God's plan that gives stability and inner peace. There is a sense in which the meaning of our lives is bound up with the meaning of the universe.

A Moral Order, 6-8

Dr. T. R. Glover has said that one difference between John the Baptist and Jesus was that for John the Baptist sin was an offence against God's law, while for Jesus it was an offence against God's love. This is a world where there is an eternal difference between right and wrong, and an inescapable relationship between cause and effect. Five burns, water drowns, poison kills, and we need not expect these laws to be rescinded if we violate their principles. This, of course, has its positive side as well. A right habit built up will enrich character for a lifetime. Living a life of transparent honesty will enable us to face the world unafraid. Being led by the Spirit we come to live for the things of the Spirit. Right habit can be a positive enrichment, just as wrong habit is sure to be a negative impoverishment. Saul Kater's, in his degenerate life was "Christ's loss," but when he received the power of the indwelling spirit of Christ, he was a new creation. Every young person should be faced with the choice whether to live for the flesh or the spirit. In thirty years destiny will be decided by that choice.

For the Duration, 9, 10

A young flapper returning from a summer resort confided to her mother that she had been engaged to three different men during the holiday. The Christian decision is not that kind of a commitment. As in the World War soldiers signed "for the duration" so Christ tells us not to follow him unless we are prepared to carry through. Those who only want to put the hand to the plough and not finish the furrow may as well not begin. Yet the promise is plain and facts verify it that those who do not get weary in well doing, reap; those who do not faint, finish. To live a Christian life is a long uphill struggle; without arduous and within are fears, but those who persevere reap a rich harvest in character, friendship, peace and power. A Christian has a sure guarantee of victory if Christ is the foundation of his thought life, his conduct and his faith.

THE HADLEY WILLIAMS CLINICAL SURGEONS' CLUB

On Wednesday last, November 3rd, the above club held a meeting, this time at the General Hospital, Guelph, commencing at 9.00 a.m., at which a number of medical men from surrounding territory, including Georgetown, Acton, Ayrton and other towns were present as guests to listen to papers and discussions on various topics of interest, directly to the medical men present, and hence indirectly to the general public. Other papers too were read and discussed under the guidance of Dr. H. O. Howitt of Guelph, who acted capably as chairman of the meeting. A resolution was passed warning the public against the indiscriminate use of a much advertised drug being sold without prescription over the drug counters, and being used for many varieties of infection to such an extent that several cases of poisoning are reported from the excessive use of the drug called Prontosil and other various trade names. The resolution was directed to the Ontario Medical Association in order that some definite curbing action be taken. A warning was also issued to the medical fraternity and others, regarding the liability of serious mental disturbances from over dosage of the various bromides used in curbing mental diseases. This latter paper was read by Dr. W. D. Cross of the Homewood Sanitarium, Guelph.

Dr. Cross, who is a "Stewarttown" man, stressed the warning that many so-called mental conditions were the unfortunate result of heavy or continued large doses of bromides, and that medical men should bear the fact in mind when dealing with certain mental diseases. Treatment of disturbances was outlined as being simple if due to bromides.

Following a very successful forenoon about thirty sat down to a very appetizing chicken dinner at the Homewood Sanitarium at which the superintendent, Dr. Harvey Clare, presided. At the conclusion, a hearty vote of thanks was extended to Dr. Clare, and to all those who had contributed to the success of the gathering.

Dr. Hadley Williams was formerly a noted surgeon at London, Ont., and the above club was formed to keep alive his memory.

WIDE AND VARIED CURRICULA OFFERED BY MILTON SHORT COURSES

The official calendar for the Milton Three Months' Short Courses in Agriculture and Home Economics has just been released and is now available to the public. It is interesting to note the wide and varied courses of study which will be covered at the respective courses. At the young ladies course Miss Lily Petty of Toronto will be the resident instructor and will take charge of the lectures and demonstrations in foods and cookery, laundering and household management. Clothing will be given under the direction of Miss L. Howell, Gainsville, while health, education, home nursing and first aid will be handled by Miss G. Hamilton, R.N. of Toronto, and home furnishing by Miss Ina Puffer of the W. I. Branch, Toronto. In order that the course may be practical as possible arrangements are already under way to secure the necessary electric stove, refrigerator, bed, etc. We understand that the same effort is being made to have the young men's class equally practical. Aside from the regular study of such subjects as soils, fertilizers, field crops, fruit and vegetables, livestock, marketing, etc. we note that such practical work as soldering, rope splicing, harness mending, diagnosing the trouble with gas engines, etc. will be covered during the course. It is also expected that special trips will be taken during the course to the Ontario Agricultural College, leading stock farms, as well as some of the leading industrial plants in either Hamilton or Toronto. Tuesday, November 23rd, is the opening date and judging by the comments overheard by the young people of Milton and district are prepared to take advantage of this splendid opportunity which is being brought to their door.
