TESTED RECIPES

APPLE SALADS

Whether fresh, dried, evaporated or canned the apple is a wholesome food, easily prepared, attractive and palatable at all times. There is no waste in a good apple. Due to the large amount of pectin contained in apple juice, it may be used in other fruits to give a consistency to jams and marmalades, and even the parings and the cores of apples may be utilized for jelly. The following recipes are taken from the bulletin "Canadian Grown Apples," issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. This bulletin may be obtained from the Publicity and Extension Branch of the Department at Ottawa free on request.

Baked Apple Salad
 Bake Canadian-grown apples until tender. STUFF the centres with nuts and raisins and serve with salad dressing or whipped cream.

Apple Salad
 Cut in dice half a pound of cold veal or pork and two large Canadian-grown apples. Add two chopped pickles, one tablespoon of celery, one tablespoon of vinegar, salt and pepper to taste, and mix with mayonnaise dressing.

Red Apple Salad
 Scoop out the centres of bright red Canadian-grown apples so as to make them into cups. Put them into water containing a little lemon juice until ready to be filled. Mix equal parts of the apple pulp with celery, grapefruit, and cream dressing. Fill the apple cups. Garnish and serve on lettuce leaves.

Brazilian Salad
 Remove skins and seeds from white grapes and cut in halves lengthwise. Add an equal quantity of Canadian-grown apples pared, cored, and cut in small pieces; also add shredded fresh pineapple and celery cut in small pieces. Then add 1/2 of quantity of Brazil nuts, broken in pieces. Mix thoroughly and season with lemon juice. Moisten with cream or mayonnaise dressing.

Cream Dressing
 Yolk of 2 eggs
 1 tablespoon sugar
 1-3 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon mustard
 Pepper
 2 tablespoons vinegar
 2 tablespoons butter
 Cayenne
 1 cup cream, whipped until thick
 Beat egg, add vinegar slowly, sugar, butter, and seasoning. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until thick and smooth. Cool. Beat in whipped cream just before serving.

FAME SPREADS

The following, taken from the Ifracombe Chronicle and North Devon News, England, refers to Mr. David Howell, who lived for some years on the Norval road and was well known in this district:

"There may be towering skyscrapers in America, and our cousins in the States may call the Atlantic a 'mill-pond,' but they cannot find any strawberries in U.S.A. to equal in size and quality those grown at Combe Martin. Two years ago some Americans staying at Combe Martin were given a description of 'Shannickshire' strawberries. They gaped incredulously and said: 'Tell us another one, do!'"

"Just to convince them, that truth is one of the typically British virtues, Mr. David J. Howell, of Berrybarrow, organized a strawberry competition at Combe Martin. It was a great success, and so was last year's event."

"The American sceptics, now silenced, began to believe that, in comparison with three-ounce strawberries, the status of Liberty is not so wonderful after all. The Sunday Press gave Combe Martin strawberries some excellent publicity. Indeed, it was stated that it took seven bites to eat the prize-winning strawberry, which weighed six ounces. A little elaborated, perhaps—but nevertheless publicity."

"Mr. Howell, as the result of the publicity afforded Combe Martin strawberries, received many inquiries from all parts of the country as to how these gargantuan berries should be grown. One of the inquiries came from an inhabitant of Kenya, and the correspondent, Mr. A. H. G. Steiny, wrote: 'I am a grower of strawberries here, and would like to have some particulars of this colossal strain. I shall be extremely grateful if you would communicate with the growers and inform me of the name of the variety. Plants could be sent by airmail and would arrive here in five days. They would act as an advertisement of your locality, as all the inhabitants of Kenya will be keen to know where these came from.' A great number of visitors from here to London would make a point of visiting Combe Martin, for Kenya has a goodly number of Devonshire people."

300 M.P.H.

Canada has ordered eighteen of what are probably the fastest bombing planes in the world! These planes will be able to fly with a complete load of bombs, from 50 to 80 M.P.H. faster than the new Trans-Canada planes.

The bombers of monoplane design are being built in Canada by the Fairchild Co., after the designs of the successful British Bristol Blenheim military plane that flies at 280 M.P.H. with full load. The power used will be two Bristol Pegasus motors of 850 H.P. each and the ships will have a cruising range of 1,000 miles with a normal load. Even with this load, there are few pursuit or attack planes in the world today, particularly in the countries that might be interested in doing so, that can fly fast enough to catch these flying arsenals. While these are being built on a "cost-plus" contract, it is expected that the total expenditure will be about \$1,500,000.
