DAVIS AND MACLAREN FOR REEVEESHIP

was now in good shape. The waterworks expenditure was down this year. Necessary repairs and an extension to the system were made. New walls were also built at the reservoir. This had been his first year in council and he thanked his nominators for again placing his name before the electors. If elected he would do his best to serve the ratepayers for another year.

Councillor Joseph Hall, chairman of the Property Committee, said that owing to the Centennial a little more money had been spent this year, mostly in the Park. A new fence had been built and painted at the entrance to the park; also a fence had been erected at the wading pool. There was no use in cleaning up the old council chamber at the town hall so long as it was used to accommodate transients. He would like to see the town hall repaired and decorated, as it was a disgrace to the town in its present condition. He thanked his nominators and said he would be a candidate for 1938. He had served one year and if elected would give his best services to the interests of the ratepayers.

Councillor Thomas Lyons, chairman of Welfare, Light and Police, said this was his first appearance before the ratepayers since being elected last year, and he thanked them for the honor they had done him. It had been a pleasure for him to see in council with the gentlemen elected last year. He was glad to participate in such a high year than just. There was more work to do and not a many appeals for relief. Street lighting cost had increased owing to the new lighting on Main St. and new lights being added. The two police officers were efficient, severe and new uniforms had been purchased. Mr. Lyons maintained that council should make out a road program for the year and pay for same out of current account. This would prevent going behind financially. He would be a candidate in Ward III and could take a defeat or a victory. If elected, he said it will serve you to the best of my ability with equal rights to all and special privileges to none.

A MacLaren, nominee for the reeveship, complimented the council of the past six or seven years for their present financial condition. He said, "The time has come, however, when we must spend money on our roads, and we should have a road program for a period of years. We should also think more about our educational situation. The young people have not got the educational facilities they should have. We should train character, ability through use of hands." The proposed addition to our high school is a great necessity. If I stand for the reeveship it will not be on the strict economy plan, but on reasonable expenditure where necessary. We should improve our town hall and make it a place to be proud of.

Will P. Smith said he would be a candidate for Council in Ward III. He had two years experience in council and would appreciate the support of the electors. If elected he would do his best.

Clarence Armstrong said he had served two years, in council and would be a candidate in Ward III. If the people feel that my services are worthy and I am elected, I shall endeavor to serve you to the best of my ability.

In the absence of David Crichton, chairman of the Public School Board, John D. Kelly, a member of the Board, very ably explained the work of the Board and expenditures during the past year in connection with the school. The Board was endeavoring to do the duty the people had elected them to do and the school today was second to none in the province in efficiency. The staff includes a school nurse and all that the Board can be doing for the benefit of the pupils. Money spent on schools is well spent. We all want to see the children get the best education. It makes life easier for them and they are entitled to all we can give them.
