Brown is daily receiving requests for games, information as to the running of same, etc. The Midget Hockey Club is ahead this year in matters of organization, with both officers and teams being chosen, and games will no doubt start about the first of the year, if not before. With this head start the executive hopes to put Midget Hockey over in Georgetown bigger and better this year. Last year the club did not get started until February and it was a grand success. There will be eight teams in the league this year, and some interesting games can be looked forward to.

ARONA ARENA GETS NEW TIME CLOCK

The Imperial Tobacco Co. have installed a new time clock and more than 1000 are now in use which will be supervised by the patrol of last year. The Free Press

states the clock is "seven feet in diameter and a deuce of a long way around." It is placed in the east end of the arena and will be visible to all spectators. The score board is of regulation type, divided into periods. An addition of this sort would make our arena one of the most up-to-date in the province, with its steam-heated dressing rooms, showers, etc. Surely the Imperial Tobacco Co. could be prevailed upon to install a time clock in an arena such as we have here.
