OUTLOOK COMMITTEE PREPARE HIS REPORT

Seven of the nine provinces and the United States were represented at the Fifth Annual Agricultural Situation and Outlook Conference which met in Ottawa, November 29 to December 2. The meeting was called to consider reports prepared by the various branches of the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Trade and Commerce dealing with all the principal farm commodities produced in Canada. These reports are an attempt to bring together all the available information concerning the supply of, and demand for the individual commodities in such a way that farmers will be assisted in making their plans for 1938.

Each year it is necessary for farmers to make decisions as to the various crops they will grow and what numbers of live stock they will prepare for market. In making these decisions they must rely in large part on the available resources of their farms, but there is each year a considerable shift in the farm market which is with this in mind that the Annual Outlook is prepared. In some years the prospects for certain classes of live stock are more favorable than others and the same is true of grains and other crops. Complete information as to the factors which will influence the prospects for 1938 will be of material aid to farmers in making their plans.

At the meeting, careful consideration was given, not only to the situation respecting individual farm enterprises, but also to the demand for farm products, both in Canada and in those countries which import Canadian farm produce. There is a close relationship between industrial conditions in Canada and the home demand for farm products. Much improvement has been evidenced in this home market in recent years but there has been a certain resistance in business conditions in the last few months of 1937. In 1937 farm prices rose more than did prices of other commodities and the relationship between agricultural price and prices of things farmers buy became much more satisfactory. This is more satisfactory condition from the standpoint of the farmer since 1936. It is difficult to estimate the extent of the present industrial recession in the United States and to determine the effect it will have on Canadian exports to that country in 1938. On the other hand the situation in the United Kingdom is more promising at the moment.

The Provincial representatives at the Conference were: British Columbia, W. H. Thornborrow, B.C. Department of Agriculture; Alberta, H. A. Craig, Deputy Minister of Agriculture; Saskatchewan, Dr. William Allan, Saskatchewan College of Agriculture; Manitoba, N. C. McKay, Agricultural Extension Service; Ontario, S. H. Symons, Agricultural Statistician; Quebec, A. Proulx, Chief Statistician; and S. J. Channon, Director of Extension Service. The Maritime Provinces: Dr. W. V. Longley, Director of Extension, N.S. Agricultural College at Truro; J. I. Stewart, and Preston Richards, of the U.S. Federal Bureau of Agricultural Economics, represented the United States.

The Agricultural Situation and Outlook Report will be issued later in December and will be available free to all farmers and others from the Publicity and Extension Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
