a meeting of the Peel County Plowmen's association, where he had been elected a director last Friday afternoon, Hugh Herbert Clark, 247 Queen street west, Barmpton, suffered a severe heart attack and died. News of his sudden passing came as a distinet shock to-a host of firends over a wide area. A son of the late John Clark of Antrim county, Ireland, and Jane Curry, Norval, he was born at Lot 16. Fourth line west, Chinguacousy, on Friday, December 27, 1861. The old Clark homestead was secured from the crown in 1828. His mother was a daughter of James Curry, a native of Ireland, and the first clerk of Chinguacousy township. His uncle GEORGETOWN Juniors journey to Hugh Clark, was the first man to import Jersey cattle in Canada. Together with his uncle, he displayed Jerseys at the first Canadian National Exhibition, and since that time, he has not missed one of the national shows at Toronto. Four years ago he made a flying trip home from western Canada in order to keep his record unbroken. Throughout his life, he took a strong interest in light horses.
