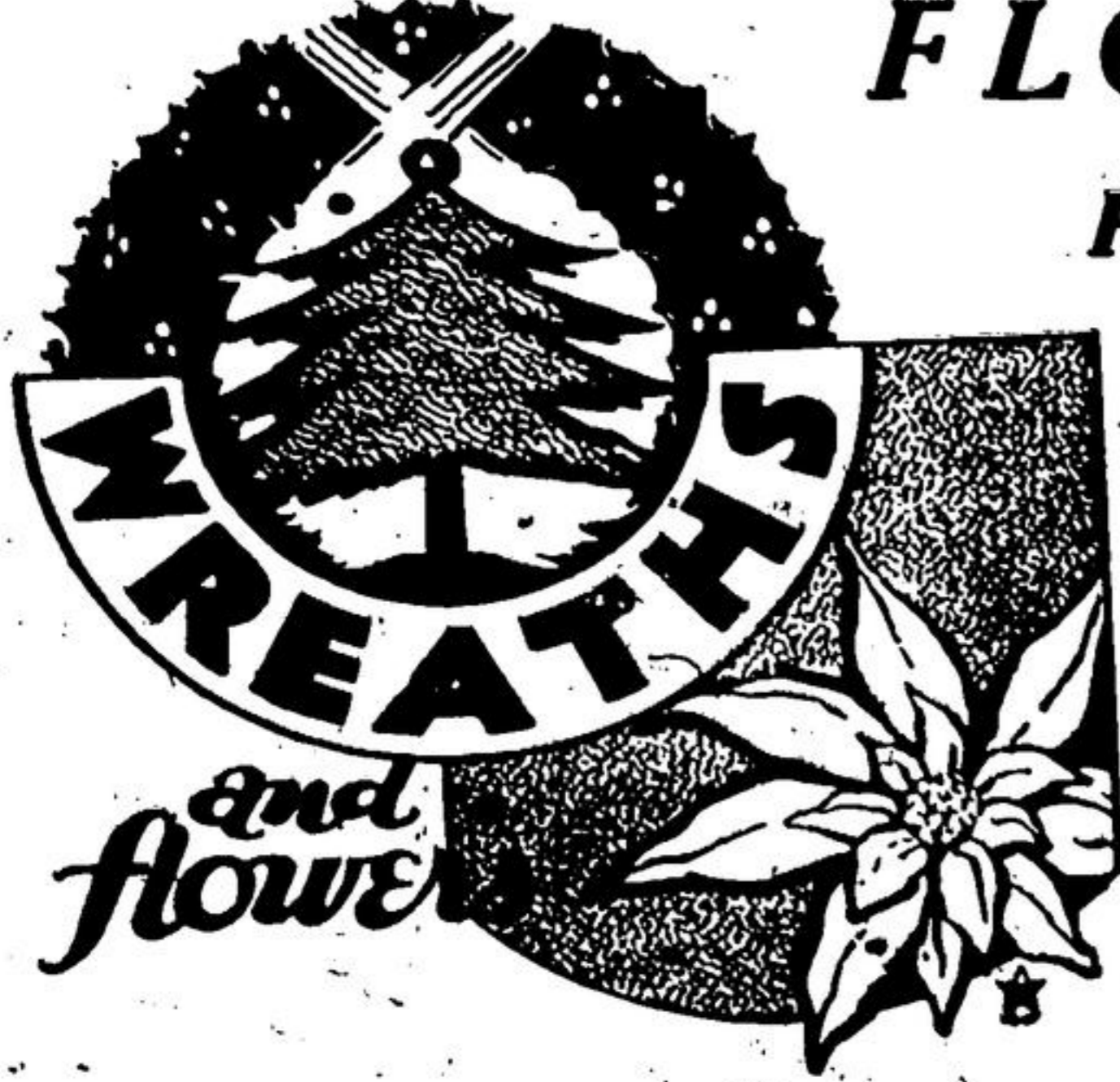

OBITUARY

SARAH ANNE HUNTER
There passed away at Elliott House, Oshelph, on Wednesday, Dec. 15th, Sarah Anne Hunter, widow of the late Hugh Clarridge in her 82nd year. Deceased was a daughter of the late Joseph Hunter and was born at St. Catharines, Ontario, Oct. 24th, 1855. In 1887 she married Hugh Clarridge, who predeceased her in 1909. They had a family of four daughters and one son, three of whom survive: Mrs. Boulter, Niagara Falls, South; Mr. Harry Clarridge, 4th line Chinguacousy; Mrs. Hugh Black, Esquimaux. A daughter, Mrs. T. C. Fraser (Annie) died in 1907; another daughter, Mrs. Heath (Mabel) died in 1929. She is also survived by two sisters and one brother, W. J. Hunter, Brampton; Mrs. McClure, Cleveland, and Mrs. Boulter, Hamilton. The late Mrs. Clarridge came with her husband to Georgetown 19 years ago and resided here until her removal to Guelph four years ago. She was a member of the United Church and a woman beloved by her family and all who knew her. The funeral took place on Friday last from the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hugh Black, Esquimaux, when the service was conducted by Rev. D. Davidson, assisted by Rev. F. C. Overend. The pallbearers were Hunter, Arnott, R. J. Graham, Douglas, Hunter, Beck, Wilson, Percy Dale, Jos. Matthews. The remains were interred in Greenwood cemetery, Georgetown.

HERBERT H. CLARK
Shortly after walking home from a meeting of the Peel County Plowmen's association, where he had been elected a director last Friday afternoon, Hugh Herbert Clark, 247 Queen street west, Brampton, suffered a severe heart attack and died. News of his sudden passing came as a distinct shock to a host of friends over a wide area. A son of the late John Clark of Antrim county, Ireland, and Jane Curry, Norval, he was born at Lot 16, Fourth line west, Chinguacousy, on Friday, December 27, 1861. The old Clark homestead was secured from the crown in 1828. His mother was a daughter of James Curry, a native of Ireland and the first clerk of Chinguacousy township. His uncle Hugh Clark was the first man to import Jersey cattle in Canada. Together with his uncle, he displayed Jerseys at the first Canadian National Exhibition, and since that time, he has not missed one of the national shows at Toronto. Four years ago he made a flying trip home from western Canada in order to keep his record unbroken. Throughout his life, he took a strong interest in light horses. Until 1931, he farmed at Lot 16 on the Third line west. Then he retired to Brampton to reside on Queen street. He was a member of several organizations in his own community, a director of the Peel Plowmen's association, a director of the Peel County Agricultural association, a past member of the Liberal executive, and was a Mason. Until 1928, he was an elder of Mount Pleasant United Church. Then he assisted with the rebuilding of Home United Church and he remained a member of this congregation until the time of his death. There he was elder, treasurer, warden, and a promoter of debating meetings. In 1893 he married Jane Copeland. In the following year he
