### PIONEER COUPLE CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING

Mr. and Mrs. John Shanks, of Lakeside Farm, Pettapiece, Man. celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage on Thursday last, Dec. 9th.

John Shanks was born in Halton County, Essex, near Georgetown, and came west in 1879. Annie Graham was born in the same county, and the Graham family arrived at Shanks' Settlement (as it was then known) in March, 1882.

In 1887 they were married and after a brief honeymoon settled on the groom's farm, where they have since resided. In 1905 a substantial residence replaced their first home.

There are four children: Prof. G. Lawson Shanks, University staff, Winnipeg; Janette (Mrs. Geo. R. Kite); Pender, on the home farm, and Laura, principal of Steep Rock High School.

On the evening of this memorable day, relatives, members of pioneer families and old friends gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. R. Kite to honor this esteemed pioneer couple.

Speeches of congratulation were made by Rev. W. Harland and R. G. Sinclair, of Rivers; C. M. Beattie and E. S. Gardner, Rapid City; Mrs. Geo. H. Short, and others. On behalf of the assembled friends, Thos. Wolstenholme addressed the guests of honor and H. M. Spearin presented a handsome bridge lamp, Mrs. Percy Stephenson a beautiful bouquet of chrysanthemums, and Mrs. W. E. Switzer a book.

An informal program of vocal and instrumental music was enjoyed and refreshments served. Tea and coffee were poured by Mrs. H. D. Graham and Mrs. T. #### COUNTY RATE OF \$8868 PAID—BONUS TO NIGHT CONSTABLE—ACCOUNTS PAID.

A special meeting of Town Council was held on Thursday evening last Dec. 16th.

Moved by Cripps, seconded by Cleave, that the Treasurer pay the Waterworks Department the sum of \$1150.00, hydrant charge.—Carried.

Moved by Lyons, seconded by Costigan, that the night constable be given a bonus of \$25.00 for additional services during the year.—Carried.
