**SWAN NOT BIRDSON, SHOULD
RECOVER THE CREDIT**

A recent advertisement of The Bank of Nova Scotia, crediting Thomas Edson with the development of the first electric incandescent lamp, is only one instance of many thousands similar to it scattered broadcast in Canada in recent years. We do not wish to discredit the work of the late Thomas A. Edison in connection with the incandescent lamp, but there is a growing tendency in the United States and in Canada, to think only of Edison in connection with the development of the electric lamp. If all the credit is to go to one man for the invention of the first practical incandescent lamp, let it go to the right man, Mr. Joseph Swan.

Swan made an electric lamp with a carbon filament as early as 1850 and gave a demonstration before the Newcastle Chemical Society of the first practical incandescent lamp in December, 1875, consisting of a paraffin thread. Edison in December, 1879, took out a patent on a lamp with a bamboo filament, but he later changed his mind and used Swan's filament which was adopted by the United States about 1882. Evidently, these later carbon filaments were the best ever made and had a long life.

It would seem, therefore, that comparatively little credit should be given to Edison for his work on the incandescent lamp, excepting to the commercial exploitation of it, as in 1882 by Edison's Edison General Electric Co. of the United States, with Swan's company in England.—Electrical News, Toronto.
