# Town Financial Affairs

AS PRESENTED BY BANK OF MONTREAL

Dear Sir:

With reference to your application for a credit of \$50,000 for the current year's expenditures against collection of Taxes, Water Rates and other revenue, our Head Office, while receiving the application favourably is anxious to have the Council's attitude toward the season's financing clearly defined at the outset, instead of using the credit only to find themselves short of funds at the end of the year.

They point out that your Liquid Assets and Current Liabilities are as follows:-

LIQUID ABSETS CURRENT LIABILITIES 8 917 Bank Loans Arrears of Taxes Accounts Payable 13433 1606 Waterworks Arrears Housing Commission ATTMATE Apparent Surplus Interest on Arrears Rent Account Woollen Bonus Loans-Arena

This shows an apparent surplus of \$5828 with no allowance for uncollectible arrears of Taxes and Water Rates, depreciation of equity in Housing Commission and other properities, etc.

To our mind the situation before the Council is, first, to obtain the co-oepration of the citizens in the payment of Taxes, and second, to co-ceprate with the spending bodies in the reduction of their estimates for the year 1933 to the lowest possible figure that will keep the Tax levy within the bounds that the property owners can comfortably afford to pay. In short, to make up a Budget for the year based on reasonable actual receipts instead of estimated receipts. Last year you will notice that you came \$13,000 short of your realization of meeting your estimates.

We have no desire to dictate a policy to the Council, but, on the other hand, as a Taxpayer and your Banker, we wish to co-operate with you in bringing our Town out of its present critical state without the interference of any outside parties. With this policy in view we trust that you can arrange some satisfactory. but immediate measure with the Provincial Housing Commission whereby this drain on the Town's resources may be eliminated; that the question of "ability to pay"be brought to the attention of the School Boards by a joint conference and that you will co-operate definitely and solidly with the Tax Collector and Treasurer in the collection of all arrears of Taxes, account receivable, etc., and where deemed necessary, exercise Municipal Rights against delinquent property owners,

In order that you may not be embarassed by the non-payment of salaries and accounts now due, our Head Office has confirmed an advance of \$5,000, against your Borrowing By-law, which will give you some time to consider and act on the points we have here enumerated.
