#### The Ottawa Spotlight

Ottawa, March 27th—The budget continues to hold the centre of the stage at Ottawa.

The paper is glowing at the thought of the load he is compelled to carry, and there is even a hint in the budget aspects of another tax which may have to be levied before the session is over. The government is considering a special tax on income tax on all income, levied at the source, to be applied on the Canadian National Railway deficit. It would be in addition to other income tax, and there would be no exemption. Such a tax, at least, it will not be introduced. By the way, railway earnings have at least held their own since a sharp fall a year ago they fell sharply the first three months of the year.

Popular as the new taxes are, it is hard to see how the Finance Minister could have done less. The annual statement received by the government is spent \$100,000,000, counting the railway. If the government is to be kept up indefinitely either receipts must be increased or expenditure must be reduced. It is not a little of both that is required. It is equally safe to predict that if business gets worse, the next budget will have to be even more drastic than did—and it was \$150,000,000 any counting railway shortage.
