Ontario Hydro Plan Circulates Funds

CONSTANTLY REVOLVING FLOW OF MONEY SET IN MOTION BY HEATER INSTALLATION

Ontario residents will obtain trouble-free automatic water heating and the ensuing low rates they pay for current used will, in the course of a year, pay for the entire Commission investment in manufacture and installation of the heaters.

But the flow of money set in motion by the Hydro Plan does not end with the heater. The Hydro Commission for its expenditure. It will permeate throughout the entire Province in the form of increased wages and salaries, and workmen's wages as practically every industrial and manufacturing section of Ontario will participate in the work.

It is already recognized that the manufacturing of such a large number of heaters will require the employment of thousands of Hydro houses in the Province will both create new jobs and increase the demand for electrical and mechanical, electric and other organizations. New materials will be drawn from various Ontario industries. New equipment and machinery will have to be created for special Hydro heater specifications.
