COMMERCIAL PAPER IN SUBJECT TO TAX

Additional taxation imposed by the budget, delivered in the House of Commons on March 21, went into effect on May 1. This is the three-cent excise tax on commercial paper. All tax exemptions on cheques are removed with the exception of cheques drawn in favor of farmers by holder of these factors. Previously, all cheques in excess of \$5 had to carry the excise tax. The limitation is now abandoned and the tax will be imposed without regard to the amount named in the cheque.

Another form of the same tax effective now is that which provides for its imposition on postal notes of the rate of three cents.

The tax will be applied to settlements, "documents" or other instruments of title capable of being sold, transferred or assigned, including mineral deeds, of royalties and bond investment trust shares.
