Colonial Mail The following is from Elson's "History of the United States": "The mail was carried by postriders, who followed the main roads as far as there were any; on reaching the roadless settlements they found their way through the forest as best they could by the trails and bridle paths. The postman left a city, not at regular interrain, but only when he received enough mail to pay the expenses of the trip. The remote settlements were fortunate if they received mail once a month. Renjamin Franklin was appointed postmaster general in 1753, and he served about 30 years. He soon made the service a paying one to the crown. Yet even then the amount
